Leading Players Seek State Title At Birmingham Club

HAGEN, ARMOUR HERE

Residents in the vicinity of Quarton Lake were astonished the other day to see a young man, with an upturned pail on his head, walk nonchalantly out on the water and disappear beneath the surface. In a small, flat-bottomed boat another young man could be seen, vigorously operating an automobile tire pump, while a third young man stood on shore holding a stout rope.

This was one of several experiments in "deep-sea" diving conducted by the trio with their home-made diving equipment. The young man who walked around on the bottom of Quarton Lake is William DeBerg, 17 years old, 827 Woodland avenue. The young man who operated the pump is William Dean, 17, of 735 Hazelwood avenue, and the third member of the scientific group is Harry Collins, also 17, of 248 Pilgrim road.

Their equipment consists of a diver's helmet constructed out of an ordinary tin pail, a dozen wooden saw teeth, a tire pump, 15 feet of half-inch hose, the flat-

bottomed boat and about 50 feet of rope. On Saturday the boys conducted their third experiment in amateur marine salvage "before the cold weather sets in." And while the sun shone brightly at intervals, a cool fall breeze blew over the lake and the divers felt their equipment was not as comfortable as they would like.
