MANY ATTEND OPENING OF NEW SCHOOL

More Than 1,300 Witness Dedication of Barnum Jr. High School

More than 1,300 persons attended the formal opening of the new \$385,000 Barnum school addition to the Birmingham public schools Friday evening in the Barnum school building. During the evening all of the school rooms were open and many persons attended the special exhibits which featured the science room, manual art room, and the new swimming pool which was also open for inspection.

The crowd filled the new auditorium to capacity and the program in the auditorium was begun by the Baldwin high school orchestra which played two selections under the direction of Arnold W. Berndt, instructor of instrumental music in the public schools. Following the opening numbers several songs were sung by the Barnum school girls' glee club directed by Mrs. Edith Roach Coyle.

Baldwin Loses To Port Huron In Another Tight Contest, 2-0

PERHAPS the fact that Port Huron secured almost twice as many yardage on punts was a prime factor in their 2-0 win over Baldwin High School at Pierce Field Saturday afternoon. At any rate, the home team was unable to prevent the visitors, usually a strong team anyway, from scoring on them.

The lone tally was made on a safety when Edwin Deer, Maroon halfback, punted from a few inches behind his own goal post line, out of the end-zone, giving Port Huron two points. The play—

Huron two points. The play was in the middle of the first quarter, and was the only score of the game. Port Huron succeeded in reaching Birmingham's five-yard line shortly before this play, causing Deer to punt, and in the second half they got to the three-yard line, but this was the closest they got. At no other time were they able to reach the goal, while once on the defense, with the ball on their 4-yard line and much of the time within 20 yards of the Port Huron goal.

Fight But Lose

Birmingham fought through the entire game, but lacked "the necessary something" to make a touchdown. The one time when the ball was on the Port Huron four-yard line time was called for Deer, slightly injured on the previous play, and when the time out period was over the punch to the goal had to have been lost, the ball going to Port Huron.

Birmingham had a total of 14 first downs to 4 by Port Huron, without a touchdown, and gained 316 yards total to 229 by the visitors. Port Huron's team did not look any heavier than that of Birmingham, but Maroon ball-carriers were faster, while Port Huron did not lose a yard. Two of the Birmingham losses, however, notably one for 23 yards in the beginning of play, were on fumbles by Birmingham. Birmingham lost a total of 65 yards.

Derwood Harris, quarterback, probably played better than any other backfield man, though James Brien, at half, ran him a close second.

Jones Stars Again

In the line, Ronald Jones, right end, showed excellently. This is the second game for Jones, a reserve brought into the Grass Pointe contest to supplant Richard Ellerby, who was out with injuries to four ribs. Jones is playing such a good game that if Ellerby hopes to regain the berth, he will have to put up a stiff battle for it. Leonard McClure also played a stellar game at guard.

James McGann, left tackle, played his last game here Saturday. He left this week for South Bend, where he will make
