Pork Chop Cocktail
Stuffed Tomato Salad

This dinner menu is a little unusual, but not expensive or hard to prepare.

Today's Recipes
Pork Chop Cocktail—Heat pounds of your favorite meat, dressing on pork chops. Roast to a golden brown and serve.
Potato Surprise—Cook and mash potatoes. Fill with cooked peas. Roll in cracker crumbs and egg and fry in hot fat until browned.
Tomato Salad—Select firm tomatoes, remove centers, stuff with shredded cabbage, chopped celery and the inside of the tomato. Cut very thin, will not cut the center. Will last in ice boxes and always worth the try.

SCANDINAVIAN NAT COOKIES—One cup butter, three eggs, beating, four cups flour, one cup granulated sugar, one-half teaspoon salt. Cream butter, add sugar slowly, creaming all the time. Add eggs, beat with and vanilla. Stir in ingredients together and add to the mixture. Shape in a roll and chill overnight. Slice thinly with a very sharp knife and bake in a moderate oven until browned, about twelve minutes.

If brownies are wanted in baking, mix with a little less flour than is called for. They will be done very soon, will not cut the center, will last in ice boxes and always worth the try.

THE Russian influence, whether in the form of a regulation Russian tunic, in a decoratively peasant embroidery note or in a modified Russian style of garment, is of real importance this year.

Many of the new suits have long skirted coats and collars that are Russian in cut. They are especially good on slender figures.

Long tunic blouses are distinguished by this Slavic trend. Regal in appearance, they come in all kinds of material, long and belted. An excellent way to utilize a suit that goes no longer to fit your need, is to add a white or gold colored sash Russian tunic. You can let your skirt down longer by putting it on an underwaist that comes well over the hips. The over-blouse, extending almost to knee length, will cover the underwaist completely.

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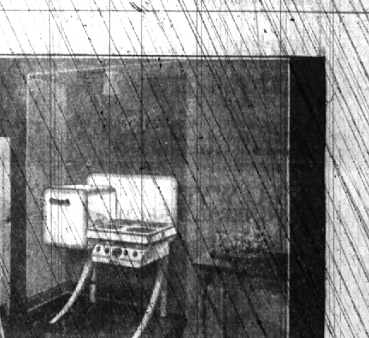
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
