## SEPT. HEALTH REPORT GIVEN

Contagious disease continues at a low level, the September report of Dr. A. W. Newitt, village health officer, shows. Cases of contagious disease reported to the health department numbered seven, with four cases of chicken

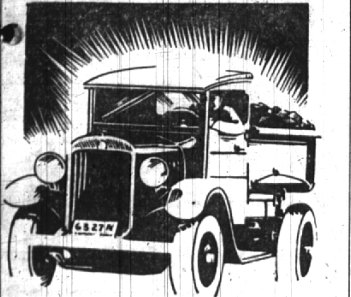
pox, one of mumps, one of whooping cough, and one of poliomyelitis.

Mrs. Olga Benning, public health nurse, made 154 home visits, visited 18 babies of less than one year old, and accompanied 9 patients to hospital. She made five prenatal visits, and referred 110 patients to physicians, clinics, hospitals, or sanatoriums.

The laboratory report shows

that 25 throat cultures were taken as well as 68 milk and 41 water samples, including two of the new Barrow Swimming pool. Other samples tested numbered 27. The sanitary inspector made 110 store and seven schoolhouse calls, and collected 48 milk and 41 water samples.

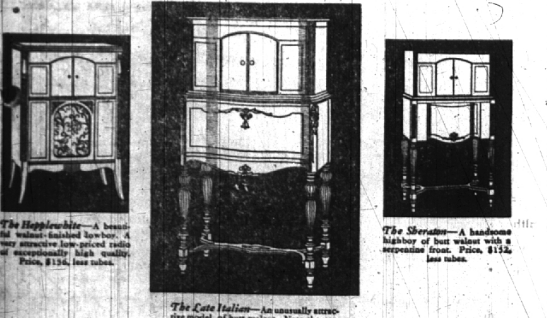
