Annual canvass for funds to continue through Oct. 10

The annual canvass for funds for the support and maintenance of the Birmingham branch of the Young Men's Christian Association this year will be held Oct. 5 to 10 under the joint direction of Mr. A. P. John and Mr. David H. Ladd. It was announced Wednesday by Robert D. Lynd, secretary of the Birmingham Y. M. C. A.

The canvassing organization, composed of groups of 10 captains with five workers each, who in turn will report to the majors, Mr. John and Mr. Ladd. Was selected following the appointment of the steering committee composed of Henry Hart, W. W. Raymond, C. J. Shain and Mr. Lynd.

WILL PREPARE PAVING REPORT

Treasurer To Inform Commission On Paving Assessment Refunds

Charles E. Plumstead, village treasurer, was to report to the Village Commission Monday upon the amount of money to be refunded to property owners in the special assessment district established for the paving and landscaping of Lincoln avenue, west of Southfield avenue. Mr. Plumstead was instructed to make the investigation following the complaint of Mrs. C. K. Latham of Southfield avenue, who held the commission property too great.

James W.
