ENROLLMENT RECORD MADE, VLIET REPORTS

2,442 Now Registered, Supt. Of Schools Says At Meeting

SCHEDULE ARRANGED

At the annual meeting held at Baldwin high school Monday evening to arrange the schedule for events outside of the regular curricula activities Superintendent Clarence Vliet revealed that at the present time there are 2,442 students enrolled in the schools of the Birmingham system. This is the largest enrollment ever recorded in the village schools being an increase of more than 100 students over last year's total registration.

The official opening of the Barnum school was set for Friday evening, Oct. 3. The building at this time will be open for public inspection and dancing will be held in the gymnasium between 7:30 and 10 p. m.

October 10 was the date set for the annual Freshman parties this year. The west side party for Junior, high students from Baldwin and Barnum will be held in the latter building with principal Howard D. Crull in charge. F. Morse Cooke, principal at Adams will be in charge of that masculine party. At both schools prizes will be awarded for the best masqueraders.

Professor L. J. Carr of the University of Michigan will be at the high school at 4 p. m., Tuesday, Sept. 30, to hold the first meeting of his class in Sociology 154, Modern Social Problems. This extension course is sponsored by the Birmingham Teachers' Club.



UNEMPLOYMENT IS PASTOR'S TOPIC

Return To Principles Of Justice, Honesty Urged As Only Cure

Only through a return to the principles of justice, honesty, mutual faith and co-operation can the nation retrieve true prosperity, the Rev. D. L. Woodward, pastor of the First Baptist Church, declared Sunday in his sermon, "Unemployment, Fat Salaries."

Mr. Woodward cited the great increase in unemployment in the United States, declaring that 5,000,000 persons able and willing to work are without employment. The causes for the condition are greed and short-sighted business policies, he said, and that during prosperous times, manufacturers overwork their employees and over-produce their materials. The monetary and present economic system were also ascribed as causes for the condition.

Mr. Woodward also cited the recent statement of former Ambassador Girard who remarked that 49 big business men ruled the government. Exercise by the government of a greater regulation and control, although all business practices and the abolition of profiteering and exploitation were advocated by Mr. Woodward.

PROPOSED DRAIN DISTRICT IS FIXED

\$200,000 Project For Territory East Of Adams Avenue Is Announced

In another part of this issue of The Eccentric is published the proposed special assessment district for the East Birmingham Drain, a project estimated to cost between \$200,000.00 and \$250,000.00. The district affected includes only property east of Adams avenue, although all Birmingham property will be taxed under the village at large share, according to N. W. Strain, Oakland County Drain Engineer.

The drain starts at Coolidge Highway where the Grand Trunk railroad crosses north of Clover Hill Park Cemetery, then comes up the east side of the tracks to Webster avenue, west on Webster to Eaton road, north on Eaton at the new east Maple grade crossing elimination, and straight north on Eaton for about a half mile.

In the near future a meeting will be held before the Judge of Probate in Oakland County, where the original petitioners will be asked if they wish the project
