

CAMPAIGN OPENS FOR SUNNYCREST

School For Girls Near Holland, Mich. Collects Funds Here, Sept. 18-20

Headquarters for the annual campaign for funds for the Sunnycrest School for Girls, a non-

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sextarian institution at Macatawa Bay, near Holland, Mich., have been established in the Boughner Bros. garage on South Woodward avenue, and school children will solicit for the fund in the residential districts Friday afternoon and in the business district on Saturday.

The campaign in Birmingham is conducted by Mrs. Anna L. Fisher, of Grand Rapids, financial secretary of the institution. The purpose of the institution is to provide a home for girls between the ages of five and 14 who have no parents or who are otherwise under-privileged. Mrs. Fisher says: Applicants must be mentally and physically normal. The work receives no state appropriation and is supported almost entirely by contributions of the friends of girls. Mrs. Fisher adds: The institution is under the direction of Helen Clarke, president and manager.

Classes in English will not be organized until the first night of school when the demand for certain courses can be determined. It is hoped that English for foreign born may be offered as well as courses in Business English and in literature.

A deposit of \$2.50 for each course taken will be required which will be refunded at the close of the term if the student in present status of the time. 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C. C. WINNINGHAM IS RACE OFFICIAL

Appointed Steward At Onwentsia, Ill. Meeting For Mid-West Horses

C. C. Winningham, chairman of the race committee of the Elmhurst Field Open Hunt, has been appointed steward of the Onwentsia, Ill., Hunt's Point-to-Point and Steeplechase meeting, Saturday, Sept. 20, when the annual elastr for middle western riding horses between the Chicago and Detroit horsemen will be renewed in a series of seven events.

Mr. Winningham, who has charge of the Bloomfield Point-to-Point meeting, which will be held Sept. 27, over the Oakdale Farm course, north of Birmingham, heads a large delegation of Detroiters who will attend the meeting at Onwentsia. Several local horses have been shipped.

Practically all of the horses taking part in the Onwentsia meeting will be shipped to Detroit for the Bloomfield races. The long drought has made the ground at both points almost iron hard, increasing the danger that is always present in these hazardous races which include many dangerous jumps that cause many a heavy fall.

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
