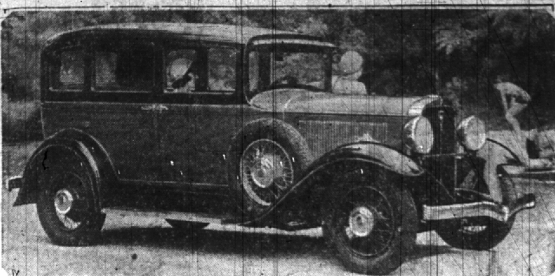
### FRANKLIN

Mr. Walter Luce, the pastor of the Franklin M. E. church, left yesterday to attend the annual

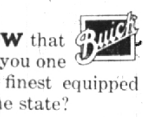
### Another Free Wheeling Car Announced
