INJURIES FATAL IN ACCIDENT AT OAKLAND HILLS COUNTRY CLUB

WAS PAINTING TANK

Injuries suffered when he fell 40 feet from the top of the water tower at the Oakland Hills Country Club on Thursday, proved fatal to Hyman Pastor, 29 years in 2001 Philadelphia housing west, Detroit. Pastor died Monday afternoon in the St. Joseph's Hospital at Pontiac. He suffered two fractured ribs, both arms broken and internal injuries.

Pastor, with three other men, Fred Rogers, Leo Lange and Edward Reddy, employed by the J. Claire Wall Co., Detroit contractor, was spray painting the water tower at the top of the tower when he lost his balance and fell, witnesses said. The injured man was rushed to the hospital in the S. O. Wylie Bell ambulance. On Monday morning Pastor was again operated on by the hospital authorities at that time when it was announced that his condition was critical.

The accident was in no way caused by negligence on the part of the contractor, according to the club, Rogers declared. Pastor lost his balance and so fell in a position to prevent to himself any injury.

TAXI STANDS TO BE RELOCATED
