Bigler Plows Through Baldwin Line To Win For Pontiac, 7-0

By W. STODDARD WHITE: Two heavy backfield visitors, Coach Bigler and his team, proved the fact that the Birmingham team is not heavy, probably were the deciding factors in the 7-0 win from the Mapleleaves in the opening football game at Pierce Field Saturday.

Bigler, heavy backfield on the Orange eleven, made the lone touchdown of the game in the middle of the first quarter when he skiffed left end on an 11-yard run. The play followed a long forward pass from the Orange eleven, and several two and three-yard gains through the Birmingham line. Bigler also made the successful point after touchdown, carrying the ball through the right end of the defenders' line.

Game Teams Ragged

The contest showed both teams to be somewhat ragged, as was to be expected after a season opener coming so soon after the start of school. Both teams were so close to the opponents' goal lines several times that it looked as if nothing could stop a score, but the punch remained, so that the ball across seemed looking.
