

OAKLAND COUNTY NEWS

Arrested in a parked automobile in which Berkeley police reported finding a pistol, three youths Saturday were turned over to Oakland County Juvenile authorities. The boys were recently released on three years' probation after having been arrested for breaking into a Berkeley residence.

Tests made during the latter part of last week and early this week showed that Rochester's new well, (although) expected to produce a large amount of water, has an output of about 100 gallons each minute.

It was at first planned to blow the well, by use of compressed air, but after the ten inch casing had been sealed with a two inch pipe left for water to flow, the air compressor could not furnish enough pressure and that test failed.

A total of \$12,423.23 must be collected on city taxes before Monday, September 29, if the city of Rochester is to have a 100 percent tax collection, which is extremely doubtful.

After a period of 90 days has nearly passed, 60 days of which were time extensions given taxpayers, there is only a total of about \$4,500 collected, according to Mrs. Beale Harvey, village treasurer. With better than \$12,000 outstanding it is believed that Rochester will have a large delinquent tax roll return.

EXCHANGE CLUBS DEDICATE HANGAR

1,500 Expected To Attend Event At Wayne Airport Oct. 4

Approximately 1,500 members of the 35 Exchange Clubs in this district are expected to attend the dedication exercises and opening of the military hangar at the Wayne County Air Station, Sunday, Oct. 4. A joint program arranged for the Exchange Clubs and the 10th Observation Squadron attached to the Thirty-second Division of the Michigan National Guard will be given.

At 3:30 p. m. the guards will give an exhibition of formation and aerobatic flying, parachute jumping, aerial combats and balloon busting. The performances of the squadron flyers will be followed by luncheon. Col. Harold B. Emmons will be the toastmaster, and the speaker will be General Everett, Chief of the Military Bureau, Washington, D. C. Entertainment will be furnished by the Signaux Exchange Club Quartet and others. Following the luncheon there will be a military ball.

Among the distinguished Guests who have been invited are: Gov. Fred W. Green; Col. John S. Bersey, Adjutant General of Michigan; Capt. Weir Cook; Gen. Edward W. Heckel, and Gen. Guy M. Wilson.
