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Uncooked Fudge Frosting—Three cups confectioners sugar, one-fourth cup (4 tablespoons) cocoa, two tablespoons butter, one teaspoon vanilla, three table-spoons milk or four table-spoons cream. Mix sugar and cocoa and sift to them Cream butter until very soft and stir in one-third of the mixture. Add milk or cream and vanilla. Beat well and stir in the rest of the sugar and cocoa mixture.

Raisin Bread—One cup raisins, one cup corn meal, one cup graham flour, three-fourths cup soda, one teaspoon salt, three-fourths cup molasses, two cups sour milk or one and one-fourths cups sweet milk, one cup raisins. Sift corn meal and corn meal, add

Slice firm, round tomatoes in one-half inch slices without peeling. Dip each slice in seasoned bread crumbs or flour and brown in hot fat, turning once. Or broil by dipping in melted fat, seasoning and cooking under a moderate flame. Serve with melted butter.

Baby Cucumber Pickles
Wash one peck of freshly picked cucumbers in cold water, dry and pack in a three-gallon stone jar to within a few inches of the top. Then cover with one cup of ground horse-radish. Heat to the boiling point, but do not boil. The following: One gallon vinegar, three cups granulated sugar, one cup brown sugar, one cup dry mustard, one cup salt, one cup vinegar.

When dinner comes, the most practical of women like at least one dinner gown into which they can slip with the assurance that they will look well-dressed and smart.

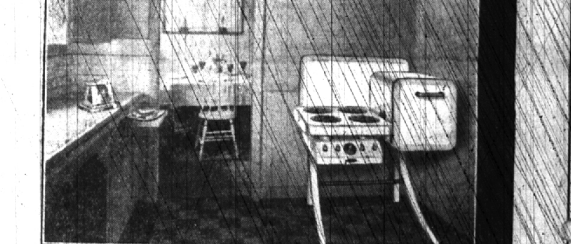
