Abandon The Theory Body Found In Woods Was That Of Bandit

Oakland County deputy sheriffs today were seeking additional clues to the identity of a man whose body was found in a wooded area north of Maple avenue near the Telegraph road Sunday by two Detroit men who were searching for berries. The original theory of the police that the man was one of a bandit trio who held up a furniture store of the Detroit Edison Company, Aug. 15, 1929, was abandoned when the bandit who had been serving prison terms, denied that there was a third member in the holdup.
