

GAME WARDENS CHARGE BY MILE

Fines Violators Pay Seven Cents For Every Mile They Were Chased

Lansing, Sept. 4.—For every mile that a conservation officer must travel in taking a violator to court, the victim is assessed seven cents in the court costs accounts. For every mile the violator travels in running away he is merely adding seven cents to his bill to the state.

At least that is the way the officers in the northwest section of the lower peninsula look at it. Officer Ray Wolters of Man-

atee apprehended William Davidson and John Tropp with a mesh of undersized fish at a place known as Loomis Landing on the Manistee River. The men were camped with their families. They promised to remain at camp while Wolters went to Waukegan to obtain a warrant. When Wolters returned the men and their families had fled.

Wolters decided they were heading home a southern state. He had three main highways to choose. Instantly told him to pick U. S. 131. Wolters speeded on cutting through wood roads and shortcuts. At Reed City as he pulled up to a traffic light he spied the objects of his search. They were taken to Manistee where they were convicted.

And instead of the 60c they would have had to pay, the officers Ray Wolters of Man-

atee's travel costs had they remained at their camp Davidson paid \$27.75 and Trapp paid \$28.15 for mileage. The 20 undersized fish they caught cost them \$3.34 each.
