Women Ask State To Indorse Resolution On Disarmament

As a preliminary to International Good Will Day to be held May 18, a group of prominent Michigan women including Mrs. George T. Hendrie, Mrs. Frederick H. Holt and Mrs. Arthur Bogue of Lansing present a resolution to the Rules and Resolutions committee of the Michigan Legislature, asking the Legislature to send peace-minded delegates to the international Disarmament Conference in 1932.

The resolution reads: "Whereas, The peoples of 40 countries are engaged in a worldwide campaign for total and universal disarmament, in order to make the League of Nations a reality, and

Resolved, that the Legislature of the Commonwealth of Michigan respectfully memorialize the President of the United States and solemnly request him formally to instruct the United States delegates to the International Disarmament Conference, Detroit, 1932, to examine all proposals for disarmament that have been advanced, and to make and to take the necessary steps to achieve real disarmament."

Accompany Delegation

Mrs. Hendrie, Mrs. Holt and Mrs. Bogue accompanied a delegation of women interested in the cause of disarmament, Detroit and Pontiac, to Lansing Tuesday for a hearing of the resolution before the Rules and Resolutions committee of the House.

Due, however, to the joint session of the Legislature, the committee was unable to act on the resolution.

A hearing will be arranged for next week, Rep. Frank Darrin told the delegation.

International Good Will Day was chosen because May 18 is the anniversary of the First Hague Conference.

Under auspices of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom the day will be observed throughout the country with dinners, mass meetings, luncheons and pageants.
