

Cranbrook Athletes Will Oppose Baldwin In Track and Tennis

SPORTS LULL IS BEING FELT

Practice Called Off During Vacation; Activities To Begin May 24

The usual lull in spring activities is being felt this week at the Baldwin High School. None of the spring sport teams is practicing this week and the regular schedules for the teams do not start before May.

Tennis and track, the two major sports, will open their season on May 1, the net team playing Ferndale at Ferndale and the tracksters engaging in a triangular meet with Port Huron and Grrosse Pointe at Grrosse Pointe. Franklin Whitney, coach of the track team, will supervise the annual inter-class meet to be held at Pieris Field next Friday, Apr. 24. An inter-class tennis meet will also be held.

The most important event on the inter-class schedule will be the playground ball league which will begin to function immediately after spring vacation. Games will be played between the different classes in both the girls and boys sections of senior high school and at the end of the season the team having the highest percentage will be awarded a prize.

Schedule Also Includes Contests With Howe

A complete schedule for the spring sports season at Cranbrook has been announced with the publication of the lists of games arranged for the track and tennis teams. Cranbrook and Baldwin will meet in both track and tennis this spring.

Baseball leads the list with its schedule of 14 games for the season. The first encounter will be with Detroit Country Day School at Cranbrook on the afternoon of Thursday, Apr. 24, while the last game of the season will be between the varsity and faculty of the school, on June 1. Most of the opponents who found a place in the Blue and Gray diamond schedule for last year are again represented in the recently published schedule. Among the newcomers are Pontiac High School which will meet Cranbrook in two games on May 18 and 22, and Battleford Hall, whose team will play the Cranbrook diamond on May 12. A feature of the season will be the game with Howe Military Academy. On the weekend of May 9, the Blue and Gray team will go to Howe, Ind., to play a game as did the fact and team last fall. Last spring the military school nine visited Cranbrook for the week-end and played the first of the athletic encounters to be arranged between the two schools.

A series of five dual meets faces the track team for the season. In its last meet, to be staged on May 27, the Blue and Gray will meet Baldwin High School in what promises to be a well contested event. A considerably larger track squad has reported at Cranbrook this year, and of course the emphasis upon that sport at Baldwin is a well known fact. Another outstanding event upon the Blue and Gray schedule will be the dual meet with the Cleveland University School to be held on Cranbrook field on May 16. On that date the visiting school will be represented by both track and tennis teams which will engage in a series of dual meets.

The tennis squad faces an interesting and anything but easy schedule in the list of 13 matches. The season will be opened by Mr. Thompson. Opening the season Apr. 21, the Blue and Gray will meet Pontiac High School at Cranbrook courts. In this sport also, Baldwin and Cranbrook will meet, two tennis matches being arranged for May 5 and 26. On May 9, the tennis squad will accompany the baseball team to Howe Military Academy.

First Barnum Play Success

More Than 400 Applaud "The Windmill Of Holland" Operetta
