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Y. M. C. A. Survey of Birmingham's School Children Reveals Best, Worst Influences

What are the interests and needs of youth today? With this question in mind the local Y. M. C. A., with the cooperation of several other local youth groups recently conducted a survey by questionnaire to which 12 boys and 11 girls responded. These boys and girls are attending the Hersey, Birmingham, and Baldwin schools, and are pupils in grades ranging from the sixth through the twelfth.

That Birmingham's youth is largely content and interested in its community, that it is generally well controlled, yet seriously lacks interest in religious matters, may be seen in the report which follows:

The primary purpose of the study was to measure the influence affecting boys and girls in Birmingham and Baldwin schools, as conducted that boys and girls who came from different parts of the city, representing various social, economic and educational levels, were questioned.

Spending \$1.13 a Week Most interesting perhaps of the compiled answers are the following statistics: Thirty-four per cent of the girls had home duties on Saturday mornings; 24 per cent of the boys and 20 per cent of the girls had work to do outside of their homes on Saturday.
