A special meeting of the "Tell-Me-Who" Brotherhood was held at the church Monday evening.

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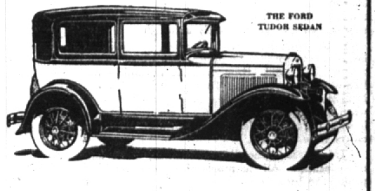
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
