This year the band consists of about 50 saxophone players, plus a set of percussion instruments, and the program will be adorned with numerous solos, quartets and sextets. Many of the arrangements of standard numbers have been made by Mr. Sawyer, who will conduct, and others have been imported from Europe where the saxophone is known for a wider variety of uses than in the United States, where it is associated with the public mind with dance orchestras.
