Cranbrook Hits Hard To Beat Detroit School Nines, 15-2 In Opener

A hard hitting Cranbrook baseball team won its first encounter of the season over the Detroit Country Day School last Friday by the score of 15 to 2. While the Blue and Gray batters were collecting 15 hits, George Renaud held Country Day out for scattered hits and struck out nine men.

It was with special pleasure that Cranbrook saw their team come through in this game, for it was in the batting that they excelled and thus demonstrated considerable improvement over last year's squad which at no time could have been classed as a hard hitting aggregation. After Renaud had struck out two Country Day players and a third had been retired on a fly to center field,

Cranbrook went to bat and collected two hits and four runs. For the next two innings, the visitors were held scoreless, while Cranbrook counted three times in each of the following chapters. The Blue and Gray played its best game during these innings, totaling eight hits, 10 runs, and turning in a perfect fielding record. When George Otis knocked a home run over first base, with two on, scoring three runs, Country Day changed pitchers and shortly afterwards began their own scoring. Talbot led the visitors in hitting, with a three bagger in the fifth, in the fifth, bringing in one run. Cranbrook scored twice in the fifth and sixth, and the game ended as it had begun with Renaud fanning two, and the third being put out on a fly.

Girls wishing to try for the team will receive a small "B" in early May this year based on the sport system used by the athletic association are Ruth Pratt and Betty Neal. Helen Hanley also may earn a varsity award providing she is a member of the tennis and baseball squads.
