

HILLS WOMAN WINS DIVORCE

Custody Of Two Children And Alimony Awarded To Mrs. H. M. Steinbaugh

Custody of their two children, alimony of \$50 a month and other settlements were awarded Mrs. Helen M. Steinbaugh, of Cranbrook road, Bloomfield Township, in a decree of divorce granted her from her husband, Varnum Steinbaugh, contractor, by Judge Frank L. Doty in the Oakland Circuit Court, Saturday.

When both will revert to Steinbaugh. In her bill of complaint Mrs. Steinbaugh charged her husband with spending much time away from their home and maintaining apartments in Port Huron and Detroit. He is now living at 3330 Chicago boulevard, Detroit. It was said, and is worth \$50,000. The Steinbaughs were married Sept. 6, 1923 and lived together until Nov. 15, 1930. They lived in the exclusive Bloomfield district for four years.

Mr. Steinbaugh's frequent, extended and unexplained absences and information as to his conduct offered by her friends was a source of humiliation to her, she declared in her bill of complaint.

Fishing Season Opens Tomorrow

LANSING, Apr. 30.—One hundred sixty Michigan lakes will be open to fishing May 1. These lakes have been designated as "pike lakes" by the Conservation Commission and fishing is permitted for all species of fish except bass, bluegills and sunfish. Fishing in "pike lakes" opens simultaneously with the opening of the trout season. On that date, May 1, trout may be taken in all rivers and streams that have been designated as open to trout fishing May 1 to September 1 inclusive. This includes all of the principal trout streams of the state as the feeder type of stream only is closed. Trout may also be taken in the lakes in the upper peninsula that have been designated as "trout lakes."
