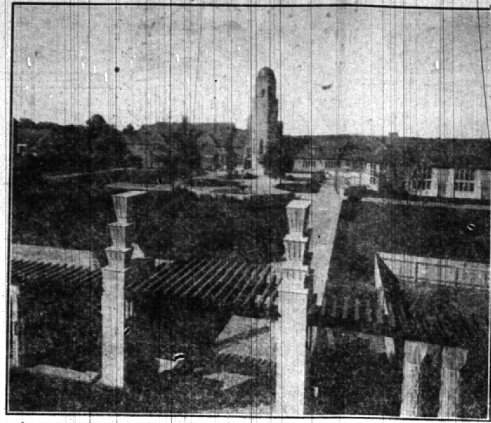

 a new and elegant car on the road, well warmed and sheathed with iron to guard against danger from loose bars. This sheathing was to prevent the rails from coming up and mingling with the passengers.
 In its early years the railroad passed through a long line of financial transactions. Meanwhile, in 1848, the Oakland and Ottawa Railroad had been chartered to build a line from Pontiac to Lake Michigan, and by legislative act of Feb. 13, 1855, that company and the Detroit and Pontiac were authorized to consolidate under the name of the Detroit and Milwaukee railroad.
 This new line was pushed rapidly toward Grand Haven, and the road was opened to Fentonville on Oct. 2, 1855; to Owosso on July 1, 1856; to St. Johns on Jan. 14, 1857; to Grand Rapids on July 4, 1858, and to Grand Haven

on Aug. 30, 1858. The first through train with passengers from Milwaukee via gateway arrived at Detroit on Sep. 1, 1858.
 On April 26, 1866, a fire occurred at the Brush Street Depot which burned the offices, freight and passenger depots and the ferry Winiford, and caused the loss of 18 lives. The former depot was constructed with a covered train shed, but when the depot was repaired this covering was left off.
Mortgage Unpaid
 When the Detroit and Pontiac and the Oakland and Ottawa were consolidated, a mortgage was given for \$2,500,000, and later one for \$100,000,000, and still another one for \$750,000. This last was given for money obtained from the Great Western Railroad and the influence of that company they became paramount in the management of the corporation.
 Also, this last mortgage was not paid and the Great Western failed. On Nov. 9, 1878, the company was reorganized under the name of the Detroit, Grand Haven and Milwaukee Railroad Company, which is one of the consolidated companies of the Grand Trunk Western Railroad Company. In 1881 the average number of men employed at Detroit was 418. Adding trainmen, the company had 521 employees at Detroit and the payroll averaged \$7500 per month. Now the employees number in the thousands and the payroll averages in the hundreds of thousands every month.
