## PEACE PARTY DUE HERE AUGUST 22

Plans are under way for the reception in Birmingham Aug. 22 of members of the disarmament caravan of the International League for Peace and Freedom, which is making a cross-country pilgrimage to secure signatures for the international disarmament petition to be presented to President Herbert Hoover.

The caravan began its transcontinental journey from Los Angeles June 21, and is expected to reach Michigan Aug. 14 making its first stop at St. Joseph.

The object of the petition is to ask that President Hoover instruct delegates from the United States to the disarmament conference to be held in Geneva in February, 1932 to vote for "total and universal disarmament."

The Michigan itinerary includes the following stops before the caravan reaches Birmingham: Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo, Battle Creek, Marshall, Albion, Lansing, where it will be officially welcomed by Gov. Wilbur M. Brucker; Bay City, Saginaw, Flint, Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti and Dearborn, which it plans to reach Aug. 22.

A special breakfast at the Dearborn Inn is planned for that day, after which the caravan will proceed to Pontiac, passing through Farmington and Northville. After an official reception by B. W. Donaldson, Mayor of Pontiac, the caravan will move on to Rochester, and thence to Stony Creek, where Mrs. Alice Van Hoesen Jones and her daughter, Miss Sarah Van Hoesen Jones will entertain members of the caravan at lunch.

The caravan plans to reach Birmingham for a dinner at the Community House at 6 P. M., at which Mrs. Edward L. Bryant of Asper road, is general chairman. An evening meeting will be held in Royal Oak following the dinner in Birmingham. Mrs. Mary Brumfield is in charge of the Royal Oak meeting.

Sunday, Aug. 23 will be observed in Birmingham and Pontiac churches as Disarmament Sunday in honor of the caravan. Mayor Frank Murphy will receive the caravan in Detroit Aug. 24, where they will be entertained at luncheon at the Hotel Statler, afterwards holding an open air meeting on Belle Isle at the Detroit Symphony Orchestra shell. A special concert will follow this meeting, with supper at the Belle Isle Casino.
