

JULY BUSY MONTH FOR JUDGE BUCK

Arrests 49 Defendants From Birmingham And Bloomfield Hills

Justice Floyd S. Buck, collected \$389.20 in fines and costs from 22 law-breakers arrested by Birmingham police in July, and \$746 from 27 Bloomfield Hills offenders, his monthly report shows. The local arraignments included

eight cases of speeding, two of drunk driving, 10 of disorderly conduct and one of reckless driving. Bloomfield Hills police presented Judge Buck with 19 persons charged with disorderly conduct, three with reckless driving, two with violating traffic signals, one with speeding and one with trespassing.

Judge Buck also assessed fines and costs amounting to \$374.85 on defendants presented by Birmingham police during the month. Four of the offenders were given jail terms and one was held to Circuit Court.

FERNDALE OFFICES TO BE COMBINED

Action Saving City \$10,000 Yearly Takes Effect Sept. 1

The City of Ferndale moved to a new administration offices and to prevent an increase in the tax rate when, at a recent meeting of the Commission, it was voted to consolidate several city departments.

The action, which will take effect on Sept. 1 and which, according to City Manager Jay F. Gibbs, will save the city at least \$10,000 yearly, combines the offices of building inspector with that of electrical inspector, the assessor's office with that of city engineer and the water superintendent's office with that of plumbing inspector.

The Commission also reduced the garage and city yards permitted by two men and passed a resolution instructing the police and fire board to study the possibility of making reductions in police expenditures.

Mr. Gibbs declared the changes would not impair the efficiency of the municipal administration. They will continue in effect until larger forces in the various departments are needed, he said.

Senior Maurice Cole of Ferndale, Farnam walked directly into the path of the oncoming automobile, and was carried 200 feet before the car could be brought to a stop.

Farnam, who was partially blind in one eye, is believed by Coroner Kimball to have become confused after a string of several automobiles had passed him as he was walking along the road, and to have stepped into the path of Quizer's car after believing that the light had passed and the road was clear.

Farnam had been in the habit of taking a walk every night before retiring, his father said. The two men operated a farm at the corner of Franklin and Telegraph roads.
