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## Tango, Fox-Trot "Have The Floor" In Europe Now

Forecasting ideas for the coming season, the tango is always difficult but if the trend in dancing is toward the European, the tango will become increasingly popular during this fall and winter.

Europe's tango-mad, The Prince of Wales and his brother took the rhythm of the tango with them back to England, and the demand for last unique and stirring beat in dance music has led writers in Italy, Germany, France, and England to produce grand quantities of the numbers. Most have Spanish or Italian titles, with words in the language of the country where they are to be played.

Sweden and Norway have even produced a not inconsiderable amount of dance-music, but it is difficult to conceive of the romance in a Swedish tango entitled, "Lillebror, vad ska du nar du blir stor?" However, the words are in English, in spite of its title, is really rather a fascinating piece.

The tango has been holding its own abroad. Only one or two waltzes were used on a program of the royal ball at Buckingham Palace July 16, though London papers were full of descriptions of the tangos and fox-trots played.

The outstanding favorite is the fox-trot, whether American, British, French, or German. The Germans are still given to waltzes and tangos, the French write a few fox-trots, but the vast majority of European dance music is in the form of American or British fox-trots. The American popular song of two years ago, with titles from "Daddy Side Up," and such mushroom favorites as the "Stein Song" are the most popular. Just coming into extreme favor abroad, especially in England, is the leading orchestra, Amsterdam plays as its standard features American tunes of 1929.

## Final Plans Made For 1931 State Fair

DETROIT—Spectacular riding by a world famous army jumping team and a polo tournament in which four of the finest teams in this district will compete for a trophy to be presented by the Cavalry Club of Michigan are among the additional features scheduled for the horse show at the Michigan State Fair and Exposition, Sept. 6 to 12.

The Detroit Symphony Orchestra, with Victor Kolar holding the baton, will provide the musical background for the colorful horse show events nightly in the Coliseum. In addition to giving afternoon concerts in the grove, keen interest has been aroused by plans for the French Fashion Review to be staged in the newly remodeled fair buildings under the direction of Mme. Marcelle D'Orsay and in which a group of Parisian mannequins will display an extensive collection of original French creations.

Following the completion of a special committee to take charge of this triple phase of the enlarged fair program, an attractive schedule of events is being developed for Friday, Sept. 11, which has been designated as Service Clubs, Foreign Trade and Canadian Day. The busy afternoon of fair weeks in front of the grandstand, the horse pulling contest, in which a Michigan team will defend its laurels, is expected to attract a great crowd. A purse of \$250 to any team establishing a new world's record is due to enliven competing teams.

Road commissioners and highway officials from counties and townships all over the state will find much to interest them in the actual demonstration of road building to take place during the week under the direction of the State Highway Department. A stretch of pavement 20 feet wide and 600 feet in length will be completed on the fair grounds, while the most up-to-date road-making machinery will be on exhibition.
