

HEAVY FINES ARE LEVIED BY BUCK

Local Justice Of Peace Henry Motter, Drunk Cases

Birmingham Justices of the peace assessed several heavy fines for cases of drunk and disorderly arranged before them in the past week.

Walter Dye, 925 West Grand Boulevard, Detroit, paid a fine of \$75 when arraigned before Judge Floyd S. Buck on a drunk and disorderly charge. He was given a choice of the fine or 60 days in jail, but chose the fine. His neighbor, Shamus Robinson, 927 West Grand Boulevard, paid \$25 rather than take a 15-day jail sentence. They were arrested in Bloomfield Hills, and arraigned Tuesday.

Two other motorists, Charles Lewis and Mary Stevens, both of R. F. D. 6, Alford, received fines from Justice Buck. Lewis paid a \$75 fine rather than serve a sentence of 60 days, and Miss Stevens paid \$20 when given a choice of that fine or 15 days in jail. Lewis and Miss Stevens were charged with being drunk and disorderly and Miss Stevens with having liquor in her car, according to police. They were arrested by Bloomfield Hills police.

A fine of \$50 and five dollars costs were levied against Andrew Peterson, of Sylvan Lake, yesterday morning, in Judge Buck's court when Peterson pleaded guilty to charges of driving drunk. He was arrested at the corner of Woodward avenue and Brown street by Patrolman Robert Appell, at 1:50 A. M. Wednesday.

That a national emergency exists and that a special session of Congress be called to deal with it was the statement contained in a resolution adopted by the Wayne County Council of the Veterans of Foreign Wars today. The resolution suggests that a "state of martial law and military control be declared."
