Firemen, Kurth Realtors Land Most Players On All-Star Aggregations

Heated Contests For Coveted Bertha Mark Voting Of Managers

Each team has 12 men and a number of players who received honorable mention. The only unanimous choice in either league was L. Hodge, Kurth third baseman in the commercial division.

Contests for most of the other positions in the commercial league, especially in the infield, were keen. Thompson at second base and Annette at short each won their position by but one vote.

Stevens, Kurth catcher is without doubt the finest backstop in the association. He is a good team player and gives fine support to his pitcher. He is also a capable hitter.

Udley is hurler. Bob Udley received a vote from all save one manager who turned in a completed ballot and he is the commercial league choice for first string pitcher. Clarence Wedge, Kurth southpaw, was but two votes behind Franklin's fast ball artist and secured the other pitcher's position. Both of the winners were pressed by Howard Whalen of the Wildcats who was the only other commercial league hurler to receive a vote and consequently took honorable mention.

Udley is a fast ball pitcher and at various times he causes up the opposing batsmen by lobbing a slow ball over the plate. Wedge proved his worth when he won two straight games from the Firemen in the city championship series last week. Honorable mention. Gunter was unopposed in the race for a first-sacker, securing a vote in every ballot. He is a consistent player and fields and hits well above the average.

Thompson of the Wildcats, also a regular in a short sacker, was moved over to second base to make room for Annette of the Firemen. Thompson was death on ground balls and played a busy game all the time. Annette covered any infield position well and was a good position hitter. Hodge gets every vote.

There was no question about the hot corner winner as Loyd Hodge, regularly a short sacker, took every vote. He held down his position creditably all season and always played well both in fielding and in wielding the stick.

The outfield positions were won by most of the Midgets. Keger of the Anderson Delivery nine and Ryan, of the Sanitary Barber Shop, were the credible catchers and good hitters. Mott is probably the best fielder of the trio but Keger may rank a shade or two higher than the other two in hitting ability.

Bob Keger, of the Anderson Delivery team, gained the utility berth in the outfield when he earned out the position. Kurth player, for the position. George Cooney, of the Wildcats, a capable player in any position, won the utility infielder's post in the commercial league.

Stevens beat out his teammate Schlaack and Powers of the Eastern Michigan Motorbus in the organization league. Jones plays with the Firemen, winners of the organization league title.

Morre La Favored. Jack Moore, also a Fireman, was unanimous choice for pitcher in the organization and Bill Spencer of the DeMolay nine secured the other hurling position by one vote over a flock of claimants. Stalker, also of the DeMolays, edged out McDonough, Hodge of the Firemen, initial sacker for that position. Jones won second base honors, and Dye took third base easily. Both are from the Eastern Michigan nine. Dye was the outstanding player on the bus-drivers' team. Fine and again he made sparkling plays to save the day and his aggressiveness was extremely helpful to his team and irritating to its opponents.

Edward Rocheleau, midget captain and shortstop for the Holy Name nine, won the short field berth when he beat out Williams, DeMolay, and Kelly, of the Lions Club. Rocheleau played bang-up ball throughout the season and several times contributed sensational plays to aid his team.

Kitchen and Hunt, both of the Firemen, won left field and center field positions, while the right field post was awarded to Fenton Westery who played a fine game for Eastern Michigan.

Weak At Bat. Kitchen probably is the best of the three, but during the last half of the season his hitting fell off and this fact nearly deprived him of position on the all-star team. Both Westery and Hunt showed good efficiency on attack as well as on defense.

Reynolds, also of the Firemen, though he participated in but a few games, won the utility outfielder's post. His work in the post-season games especially impressed the critics. He would have won a regular position except for the fact that he was in such a small number of contests. James Kelly, of the Lions, took the utility infield place.

Deer Law Violators Not to be Granted Licenses This Year

Lansing—Anyone who has violated a deer law within the past three years or who has wounded or killed another by shooting within the past five years cannot obtain a deer license from the Department of Conservation this year.

Affidavit forms to be filled out by all applicants for deer licenses have been prepared and will be distributed to all license agents with the deer licenses. The 1931 legislature provided that no deer license should be issued to any person who has been convicted of violating the deer laws within the preceding three years, or who has during the preceding five years, "accidentally shot or otherwise wounded or killed by shooting any human being."
