## 15th Annual Horse Show At Northville Set For Aug. 27-29

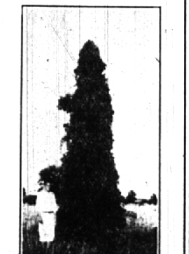
