BALDWIN BOWS TO DEARBORN

Enemy's Fast Passing Attack Submerges Maples, 15 to 8

The Baldwin varsity basketball squad dropped Thursday by a 15 to 8 count. The game was played at Dearborn. Canever and Lucas, the two scorers, were the only point men for their respective teams, Canever scoring three points and Lucas twelve.

Lucas started the scoring with a field goal in the first quarter which was quickly matched by Canever. From then on the lead saw-sawed back and forth, the half ending in a 5 to 3 tie. Lucas quickly put his team in the lead in the second half by making five field goals. Melby and Ellstrom each made good their tries from the free throw line.

Bunyan popped a field goal and Hunt and McKee made one free throw apiece to complete the scoring.
