Dr. Kemp Gives Talk On Health To P. T. A.

"Health As Related to Education" was the subject of an address by Dr. William Lloyd Kemp, village health officer, before members of the Parent-Teacher Association of the Parkman Intermediate School Thursday afternoon, at the school. The need of co-operation between the American home and the American school was emphasized by Dr. Kemp, who said:

"It is the privilege of parents and teachers to help this generation now growing up to advance beyond their own; a combined influence which tends to bring about better home and school life."

Dr. Kemp urged parents to take advantage of modern medical preparation in the checking of disease. "In comparison with the record of 15 years ago," he declared, "for every 20 children who died of diphtheria, we have only one today."

"The importance of good examples set by parents in both ethics and hygiene was also stressed by Dr. Kemp as a factor helpful in training children."

The lecture awarded each month to the room in the school represented by the highest percentage of methods at the monthly P. T. A. meeting, was presented for December to the room taught by Mrs. Christian Corwell.

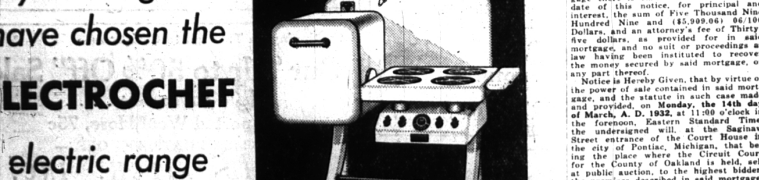
