Thanksgiving Baskets Distributed Through Community House

Thanksgiving Day was just that in Birmingham last Thursday. A total of 142 baskets of food were distributed to needy families through the medium of the Community House, gladdening the hearts of giver and receiver alike. Of these, 51 baskets, heaped high with meat, potatoes, vegetables, fruit, cereals, sugar, milk, coffee, eggs, butter and other goods, were distributed by the house for Thanksgiving by the Goodfellows Club, which also sent out seven more on Thanksgiving Day to families late in reaching the relief lists.

A special shipping of potatoes and generally low prices offered by local merchants for the occasion enabled the relief to fill its baskets at an average cost of 86 cents.

Other baskets were either distributed directly by the Community House, or by individuals and church and women's organizations. Both Christ Church Cranbrook and Holy Name Church also cared for several families in their own parlors.

Students in the public schools also aided materially with unsolicited contributions of food and clothing. Nearly every student, although not asked to do so, contributed something to a welfare collection, part of which was distributed through the Community House.

taxpayers was assessed at new high figures all out of proportion to the property of some others, without any apparent justification.

The fact that some portions of the county were not reassessed on the same basis of valuation used in the other portions, but were allowed to retain the lower figures was pointed out by the county board of equalization. This, he said, was an injustice.

Charges Favoritism The reassessments have had only one effect. They have changed the distribution of the tax burden among the individual taxpayers residing or paying taxes in the districts affected.

It declared that the Commission found "some property owners in the past" had been "unduly favored at the expense of other owners," and claimed that the new valuations would be a positive benefit to several taxpayers.

In Bloomfield Township, for example, it declared, "the total valuation, as fixed by the Commission, is 50 percent above the 1921 figures of the supervisor. This means that all taxpayers whose valuations were increased by the Commission by less than 50 percent will pay fewer dollars of taxes than they would have paid on the basis of the original assessments."

Defends Brucker Obviously hoping to quiet the criticism that has arisen against Governor Wilbur M. Brucker in connection with the Commission's activities in Oakland County, the Commission claimed full responsibility for the new valuations in the following paragraph:

"The State Tax Commission is created by law as a quasi-judicial body. Its membership holds over from one administration to another and it stands prepared to accept full responsibility for its own acts. Recent attempts to lay this responsibility at the door of other state officers has an unfair reflection upon the ability of the Commission to stand on its own feet, and clearly show the partisan source of the opposition which has arisen.
