A course on divorce! To say that the Detroit Board of Education is considering the advisability of offering students at the College of the City of Detroit a course on divorce seems a bit peculiar.

Dr. Burt R. Shurly's idea, it seems, is to introduce by him at a recent meeting of the board the proposition that "the superintendent of this institution in consultation with the dean of the College of the City of Detroit and head of the department of sociology be requested to formulate a special course in the study and prevention of divorce which will be offered as a elective in the college curriculum."

Economically, Dr. Shurly declared in his resolution, the problem of "human relations" is "ahead of all other social problems and the art of getting on with others seems to be in jeopardy, from lack of proper instruction."

In reply to the resolution, Mrs. Laura F. Osborn, for many years a member of Detroit's Board of Education, suggested that investigation of the social conditions in Detroit might help to remedy the divorce evil.

And of course Mrs. Osborn's suggestion is right as far as it goes. She added the comment: "If all men enforced the laws,

Board Cites Service, Devotion Of Mrs. Retta M. Barr

Mrs. Retta M. Barr, one of the principal figures in the founding and development of Baldwin Public Library, was commemorated in a resolution of regret for her death adopted unanimously by the Library Board, which she served 17 as a member and 16 years as president, at its November meeting last week. Mrs. Barr's death occurred early last month.

"Whereas, death has claimed Mrs. Retta M. Barr, president for many years of the board of the Baldwin Public Library; and whereas, Mrs. Barr's services on this board exceeded in duration that of any present member, dating back to the youth of the institution which Birmingham today is justly proud to possess."

"Whereas, for 17 years Mrs. Barr gave freely and generously, not of her time and efforts alone, but of those intangible things of the spirit which aided so greatly in carrying the institution through its earlier years."

"Be it therefore resolved that, on behalf of the Library Board and the community which uses and finds enjoyment in this institution, we express in wholly inadequate words our deep sense of loss in the death of Mrs. Barr and our equally deep sense of pride at having been privileged to know her and to work with her."

"Be it further resolved that the secretary be authorized to spread these resolutions upon the minutes and to transmit copies to the survivors of the deceased and to The Birmingham Eccentric."

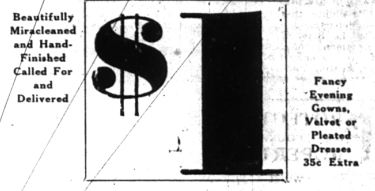

"Suppose I forgot your salary for several months?"

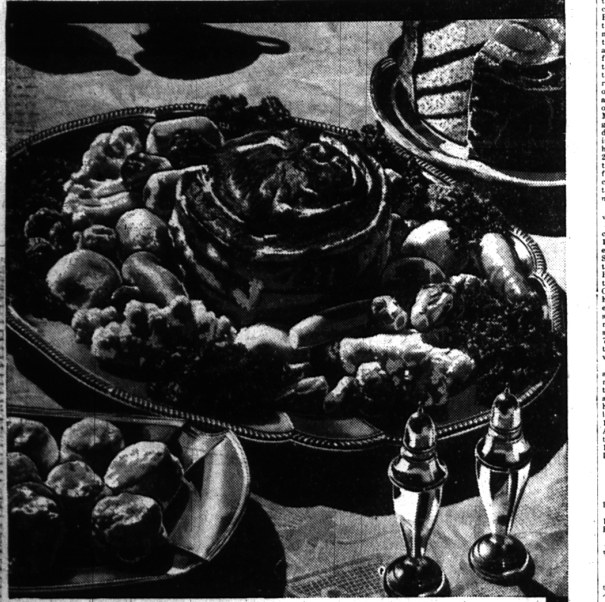
