Add To League Lead By Win Over Much Improved Team Wednesday

Adams Junior High School basketball team further increased their lead in the race for the league title when they beat a greatly improved Barnum Junior High School quintet on the latter's court last Wednesday afternoon, 10-5.

The Barnum team showed a vastly improved defensive game and gave the experienced Adams courtiers, who have been undefeated this season, a battle throughout the game. On offense each team chalked up two field goals, but Adams won on the ability of their men to register their gift shots from the free throw line. The score at half time was 8-2 in favor of Adams. Schwarz of Adams was the game's high scorer.

Joies, a newcomer in the Barnum lineup, scored both of his team's baskets and played well on defense.

Coach E. T. Engel, who began work at the beginning of the basketball season with a group of boys who never before had played on a regular team, has made an outfit that defensively at least rates on a par with the other junior high teams in the village. Birmingham, Michigan Board of Education met on January 26, 1931. The regular meeting of the Board of Education was held in the office at 8 P. M. Present: Leigh Lynch, Ray A. Palmer, Harlow N. Darrow and W. G. Hutchinson, constituting a quorum. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved. The following letter was ordered entered on the minutes: VILLAGE OF BIRMINGHAM, MICHIGAN, January 14, 1931

My dear Mr. Vliet: A case of small pox has been reported to the Health Department in the person of Clarence Cummings of 909 Berkeley Avenue. Inasmuch as he has been in attendance at Baldwin High school while afflicted with this disease, I am issuing the following order, applicable to Baldwin School:

1. All children, teachers, and other employees shall be vaccinated or revaccinated against small pox at once, provided they have not been successfully vaccinated in the previous five year period, or unable to give evidence of present certification of such successful vaccination.

2. All children, teachers, or other employees not complying with the above paragraph by midnight January 16 shall be excluded from school for seven days (7) days from this date.
