Importance of Senate Investigation Rights Are Defended

Robert Marion LaFollette, Jr., was born at Madison, Wis., Feb. 6, 1874. For six years he was secretary in his father, Robert M. LaFollette. In 1905 he was elected to the U. S. Senate to fill the unexpired term of his father. He was re-elected in 1928. He is editor of LaFollette's magazine and a Progressive-Republican.

THE SENATE, as a forum for free debate on national and international affairs, is performing a function vital to the welfare of the country.

We are always hearing the senate attacked because, as they say, it investigates too much.

The senate exercises the power of inquiry delegated to it by the constitution. Any real study would show the need of this power of inquiry.

When they criticize the senate, they usually laud the house of representatives.

The executive by the senate of its prerogative of investigation was responsible for the exposure of the oil scandal and other governmental evils, and the power of the senate does not need curtailment.

The naval oil scandals would never have been exposed were it not for this power of the senate.

The power of "freedom of debate" in the senate was in large measure responsible for woman suffrage as well as for many other important acts.

We have heard a good deal of criticism in recent months, because we have not always agreed with the executive. May I point out
