Baldwin Senior Washington Group To Leave For Nation's Capital, April 11

Approximately 70 students of Baldwin High School will be shown the train when the annual Washington excursion leaves Detroit, Saturday, Apr. 11, for the ninth annual Washington trip.

The complete itinerary has been announced by W. S. Toothaker, senior adviser, and the other advisers, Miss Ruth Hill and Miss Emily Walker.

The special train leaves Detroit at 3:50 p. m. and arrives at Harpers' Ferry, the following morning, (Sunday) where the group will have breakfast at the Hilltop House.

The train arrives in Washington Sunday afternoon and the group will lunch at the Hotel Cairo and spend the afternoon at the New Smithsonian Institute. They will return to the hotel for dinner and will spend the evening at the Library of Congress.

Will See Cathedral Monday morning the group will journey to Mt. Vernon, the home of George Washington, Alexandria, Arlington National Cemetery, and the New National Cathedral which is now in the process of construction.

It is hoped to have this structure completed by next year to celebrate the two-hundredth anniversary of the birth of Washington.

Monday afternoon the tourists will motor to Annapolis where it is hoped that they will see the mid-

shipmen on parade. A dinner and a party at the hotel Monday night will complete that day. The Lincoln and Washington memorials, Bureau of Printing and Engraving and the New National Science Building will be visited. The Pan-American, and the White House will also be included in Washington's itinerary. The group will return to the hotel for lunch.

In the afternoon the group will visit the Capitol Building and leave late in the afternoon for Baltimore from where the group boards a boat for a trip down the beautiful Chesapeake Bay. The group will dine on the boat and spend the night riding down the bay. After breakfast on the boat Wednesday morning, the group gets off at Norfolk, Va.

Go To Pt. Comfort After the Navy Yards are visited at Norfolk, the group will board a transport and go to historical Point Comfort. Fort Mifflin is situated on this point and in this near vicinity the famous battle between the world's first two iron-clads, took place.

The group hopes to be entertained by Uncle Sam's soldiers at Old Point Comfort. Wednesday afternoon the group will visit Williamsburg, Va., where there, and visits the Pruden Parish Church and the campus of the college of William and Mary.

From Williamsburg, the Washingtonians board a train for Richmond where they arrive in time to

Motorists Given Road Precautions

"The winter months are full of unusual road hazards that demand extra precaution on the part of drivers of motor vehicles, particularly heavy trucks," declared E. S. Barden of the Hunton Tire Co. Goodyear dealers, located at 534 S. Woodward avenue.

"Freezing weather, snow and ice, produce driving conditions that call for extraordinary care to avoid accidents.

"Under these conditions balloon tires, the type that is rapidly being regarded as ideal equipment for trucks, both in local and long distance service, are particularly valuable because the large contact area of the balloon tire drives the truck more steadily, stops it more quickly and gives a sure way to ward preventing side slip and skid.

"During the winter months it is especially good policy to avoid riding the car trucks in city driving. The rails are smoother than cobblestones, of course, but if a sudden stop is necessary, brake alone cannot stop the truck. Locked wheels on the rails like skates on ice and if an attempt is made to pull off the rails, there is the ever-present danger of being thrown into a skid. The street car motorman can put sand on the rails; the car or truck driver cannot.

"Brakes should be checked and corrected frequently during the winter months and tires likewise should be in good condition with a good effective gripping surface for greatest safety."

Arrival Of Marble Shipments Speeds Construction At White Chapel Park

Construction of the Temple of Memories at White Chapel Memorial Park, on Long Lake road just east of Crooks road, is advancing steadily and shipments of marble from Italy are being received regularly, making it possible for the workmen to complete the first floor of the building by the middle of March, John Wendolph Superintendent of the park announced yesterday.

Shipments of botticino marble are being received from Italy in 50-ton lots through Mavogioni Ltd., and the entire project will require approximately 200,000 square feet of the marble. Following the completion of the first floor of the mausoleum, work will be begun on the Great Hall, in the meantime, Bruce Wilder Saville, sculptor of the central bronze statue, "Until the Dawn,"

is working on another bronze group for the central fountain. The group will be known as "The Spirit of Flight."

Organ Paris Arrive The colonial organ, from which music will be broadcast upon the installation, awaits further construction in the main hall. Part of the organ, one of the largest in this part of the country, has already arrived.

White Chapel Memorial Park is one of the features of the countryside adjoining Bloomfield Hills. The cemetery is large enough for 70,000 graves but no tombstones are permitted to detract from the general beauty of the park. The mausoleum is designed as an interment and inurnment place for several thousand more. The Polar Bear Memorial, erected in honor of the World War heroes, members of the famous Po-

lar Bear Division which saw service in North Russia, was the center of one of the greatest military funerals in history last summer when more than 50 of the veterans whose bodies were returned from Russia, were buried there.

Other features of the park are the general gardening plan, the sprinkling system, the chapel, crematorium, and greenhouse. White Chapel Memorial Park has a \$300,000 endowment fund.
