Chaperone 40 Children to Hear Symphony Orchestra Concert

Next Tuesday afternoon mem-
bers of the Thursday Musicians,
which club is sponsoring the plan,
will chaperone another group of

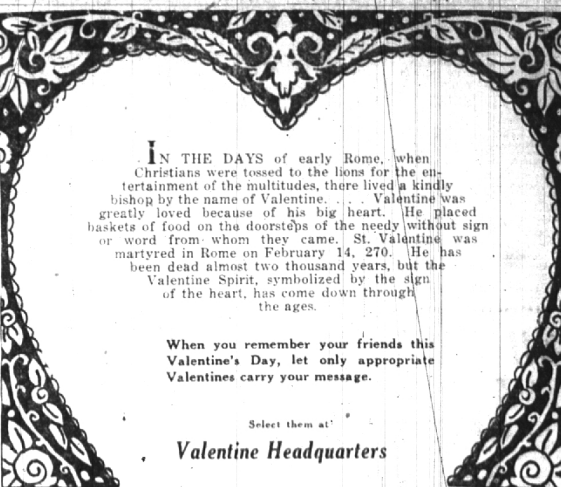
