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## HOCKEY TEAM IN SIXTH TEST

### Birmingham Club Will Play Cranbrook At Quorton Lake Today

The Birmingham Hockey Club is scheduled to hold its sixth test of the season on Quorton Lake this afternoon, meeting Cranbrook School for the second time. The first meeting between the two clubs this season resulted in a 2-1 win for the Birmingham team. Saturday afternoon the team fought to a 0-0 tie with the Cranbrook Hockey Club on the latter's ice in a poor game. This was the fourth match of the season for the Birmingham sextet. All four previous matches have proved victories for the local hockey players over Cranbrook Hockey Club 6-1, over Chi Psi of U. of M., 8-1, over Cranbrook School 2-1, and over Detroit Country Day School 4-0.

While a schedule for the remainder of the season is not complete, games have been scheduled with Detroit University School, Detroit Country Day School, and Bachelorette Hall of Romeo. The Birmingham Hockey Club is interested in securing matches with municipal or school teams in the vicinity.

So far the season has had fair success to be successful as have the past, which have made the club one of the best in Southern Michigan. In 1919, the first season of a season of 19 games one was lost and one tied. Last year two were lost out of 12.

## Fathers To Meet Cranbrook Faculty

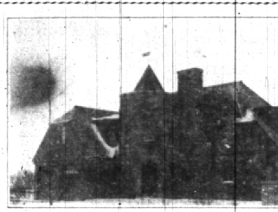

## COUNTY HEADS AGREE TO SALARY PROPOSAL

Four Oakland County officials who declined to accept proposed cuts in their salaries because the law permitted them to be paid on a fee basis, have agreed to accept the equivalent of their former salaries in lieu of fees to which they are entitled, it was announced Friday by the Oakland County Board of Auditors.

The four officials, Sheriff Frank Schram, Burton E. Daignault, county clerk, Miss Mahel Broughe, register of deeds, and Albert W. Wilson, county treasurer, entered into what constituted a contract with the county Board of Auditors to receive their pay in this manner. The agreements were drawn in such a way that they will not conflict with the state law which provides that no salaries shall be fixed for heads of these four county departments in counties where the population exceeds 100,000 persons.

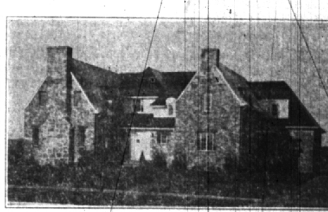
## ORR OPENS NEW LAW OFFICES IN PONTIAC
