2ND NIGHT SCHOOL TERM OPENS FEB. 3

Bigger Enrollment Expected At Business Classes In Baldwin High Rooms

The second term of night school opens at the Baldwin High School Tuesday night, Feb. 3, at seven o'clock, at which time all interested students are asked to enroll. A total of 80 were enrolled the first term and many of this number have signified their intention of continuing their study.

Subjects to be taught will include typing, shorthand, book-keeping, business arithmetic and English. The school will meet each Tuesday and Thursday night for a twelve-week period from seven to nine o'clock. A deposit of \$2.50 is required for each student studied which will be refunded at the close of the term if the student is present 75 per cent of the time. A class in English for foreign born will be offered if there is sufficient demand for it.

Ferdale Scores In Last Few Seconds To Defeat Baldwin

Nine brief seconds decided the fate of the Baldwin High School basketball team Saturday evening and gave Lincoln High of Ferdale the opportunity to nose out the Maples, 36-34, in the closest and most exciting game of the season.

The victory came for the Rail-splitters nine seconds before Tiner Donald Joy's final whistle when one of their number sank the goal which gave them a two-point lead and victory. Baldwin had opened the game with a lead, but a whitewind second-period attack had raised the Lincoln five from the short end of a 15-5 score to one of 15-10, and a minute later to one of 17-12.

Although commencement exercises will be held in the Baldwin Auditorium Friday evening, the Baldwin team will journey to Wyandotte to meet the downriver five on its own court. This is a Southeastern League game, and the seventh of the season.

The teams were tied 19-19 in the first two minutes of the third period, but the next minute Lincoln slipped into the lead and by the end of the quarter they held a three-point lead. Early in the final frame Baldwin stepped up to the score until the fateful last-nine seconds.

The game was packed with thrills and fouls. McArthur, star Lincoln center, was put out of the game near its end, penalized for having four personal fouls against his name, and Sheehan of Lincoln and Harris and Deer of Baldwin each had three against their names. Scarcely a man in the game had less than two fouls.

Birmingham's wall of defense was not all it might have been. Although the line would be stretched across the floor each time the Lincolns got the ball, frequently
