D. U. S. BEATEN BY CRANBROOK

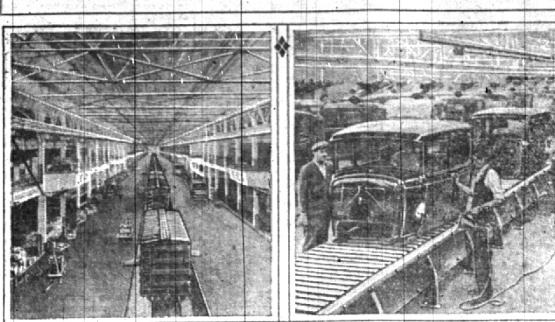

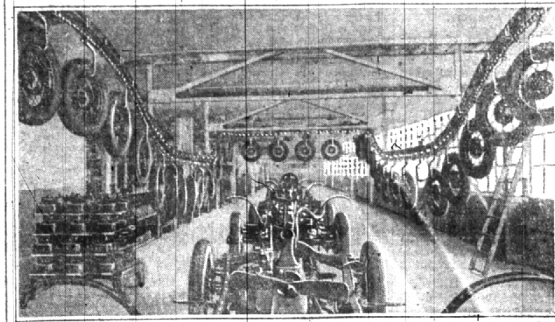
Class Party Is Held By Mid-year Grads

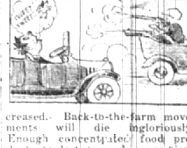

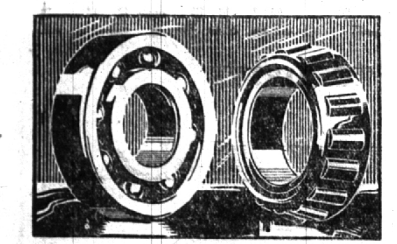

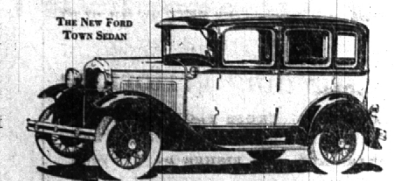
