

EVERY AWARD IN BOY SCOUT LIST WILL BE MADE AT COURT OF HONOR

Every award which can be made to Boy Scouts and their troops in Birmingham will be made at the annual winter court of honor, to be held in the Community House auditorium Jan. 23, members of the Birmingham District Committee, B. S. A., announce following closing of the time period for applications, last Friday night.

Preliminary tabulations have been made on the awards to be given and within a week the complete report will be made from the office of the Detroit Council, with which the Birmingham district is affiliated. All Birmingham applications have to go through the Detroit Council and a few through the National Council at New York.

Application for the award of Eagle Scout, highest the organization can confer, has been made by Stoddard White, of Troop 3. Two awards of Life Scout, made for 10 merit badges earned, and five of Star Scout, for five merit

for merit badges earned over the required 21 for the rank of Eagle Scout. The Silver Palm is given for 10 merit badges earned over the required number, and is the highest single palm awarded. Other combinations can be made, however, by presenting two or more palms at different intervals.

Q. Certificates for Junior Assistant Scoutmaster will also be given at the court.

Give Other Awards. Every award for individual and troop work made by various organizations will be up for contest at this court. The Charles R. Peck Sons inter-troop advancement trophy, a semi-annual award, will be up at the court, as will the Honor Patrol banner, troop parent attendance banner, and The Birmingham Eccentric Honor Award, which is being presented for the first time.

The Eccentric award is for the outstanding Scout in Birmingham, and will be made an annual award. It consists of a plaque to be hung in the Community House, suitably engraved with the date, name, and troop number, and of a medal to be presented to Scout winning the award. It is the first concrete recognition of individual Scout achievement ever presented in Birmingham.

An accompanying citation will be prepared and read by Col. Ed. Williams, Scoutmaster, and will be presented to the winner by the donor of the Lower Long Lake camp which bears his name. Col. George prepared a similar citation for Junior Assistant Scoutmaster Howard Senteney, troop 2, last year. Senteney's name will be placed on the Eccentric plaque as the winner for 1929 and he will be awarded a suitable medal also.
