No Two Spoken Sounds Have Ever Been Alike, New Speech Detector Shows

Ann Arbor.—Probably never in the history of the world has a given spoken sound been uttered exactly alike. This very great variation in the spoken word has been indicated by a new apparatus devised to detect and record the muscular action in speech, and which it is hoped will reveal the true nature of the muscular "tangles" which cause the stammerer to hesitate before getting out certain sounds.

This new technique for the study of normal and abnormal speech was developed in the psychological laboratories of the University of Michigan by Dr. Ray K. Immel, dean of the school of speech in the University of Southern California.

"Most stammering is functional and not organic, that is, the organs of speech are intact, but do not act properly," says Dean Immel. "In an automobile engine the many moving parts must always be in an exact position with relation to one another when the spark comes to fire the cylinder. If the spark comes too soon or too late we have an engine performing jerkily and haltingly. Stammering may be compared with this behavior, according to Dean Immel.

Every sound uttered involves an adjustment of lips, tongue and throat muscles which must be correct before the air can be allowed to pass through the throat and mouth; if some of the muscles are out of line with the rest, air is expelled too soon, more or less stammering ensues.

In the living subject it is impossible to observe the workings of the interior muscles of mouth and throat, based in producing sounds. The Immel apparatus attempts to study the external manifestations of this inner movement by means of tambours which at-

Most surprising is the discovery that while the mouth is actually uttering one sound, other muscles of the throat and mouth are getting ready to form the next sound, so that speech is a continuous, unbroken process. 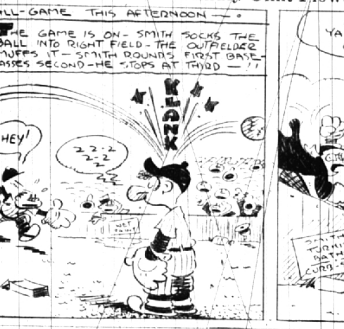

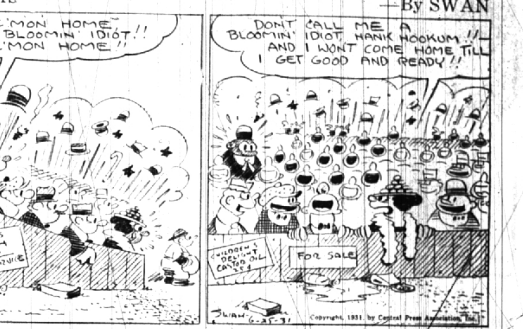

ORDINANCE NO. 27
An Ordinance Relative to Disorderly Persons.

Section 1. That all persons who being of sufficient ability, refuse or neglect to support their families; all common prostitutes; all persons who shall be drunk or intoxicated or engaged in any indecent or obscene conduct in any public place; all persons who shall be found loitering in a house of ill fame or prostitution or place where prostitution or lewdness is practiced, engaged in the sale of liquor, or in the possession of the value of Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars or less in their possession, all persons pretending to tell fortunes, all persons who keep any gaming table, or who shall sell or offer to sell any gaming device, or who play with cards, dice or other instruments for gaming in any public place within the limits of the Village of Bloomfield Hills, all persons who use any indecent, immoral, obscene

language or insulting language or who shall use such language in the presence of women or children in any public place within the limits of the Village of Bloomfield Hills, all persons who shall be found loitering and loitering in any public place within the limits of the Village of Bloomfield Hills; if any above described person shall be found within the Village limits of the Village of Bloomfield Hills, they shall be deemed disorderly persons.

Section 2. Any person convicted of being a disorderly person shall be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred (\$500.00) Dollars and costs of prosecution or by imprisonment in the Village Jail of the Oakland County Jail for a period of not more than ninety (90) days of both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

Section 3. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances of the Village of Bloomfield Hills conflicting with or contravening or inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance be hereby repealed.

Section 1. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days from the date of passage hereof.

ORDINANCE NO. 26
An Ordinance Relative to Trespass Upon Real Property.

Section 1. Every person who shall commit any trespass by entering upon the garden, orchard or other premises of another person situated within the limits of the Village of Bloomfield Hills, or upon said land or premises, and who shall take or carry away, destroy or injure any of the fruit, vegetables or crops therein being or growing, and injure or destroy any tree, bush, vine or plant growing or being shall be guilty of misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine and costs of not more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, or by imprisonment in the Village Jail of the Oakland County Jail for a period of not more than ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

Section 2. This Ordinance is to take effect twenty (20) days from the date of passage hereof.
