Some had envisioned a future of fine estates and more beyond Birmingham not long after the abandonment of toll gates, but the real migration of well-known business and professional men did not get under way until after the dawn of this century. Thousands of acres of old-fashioned farm land underwent a change, and here and there sprang up a magnificent mansion, surrounded by the best in nature deftly arranged by the landscape architect. And driving horses there were and plenty of them, for you must remember automobiles were not so common, even 25 years ago.

Not a few of these estates were those of people who had figured in the Gross Pointe colony. There was so much land in the natural state of the open meadows that why Reynard considered this his own domain, and he ate the berries and the insects, with an occasional fat hen when celebrating a new litter of young freeborners. It was natural that the Gross Pointe fox hunters should pick up on this when their own section became untenable for the sport, and that is the why of the Bloomfield Open Hunt.

It was in the fall of 1914 that the east riders inaugurated fox hunting with hounds in that section, which the farmers thought was overdoing things a bit when a shot gun is so certain. But these invaders were sportsmen, and while they like to knock down pheasants, ducks or geese, the shooting of a fox would be a desecration. The first hunt went over big with those who had mastered the taking of fence, bushes and ditches, so that soon after about 20 of the Bloomfield Hills
