

NEW LAW RULES ON MOTOR BOATS

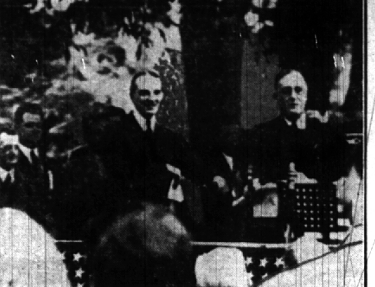
Prohibits Excessive Speed, Recklessness On Inland Lakes
 Lansing—Under an act given immediate effect by the 1931 legislature, conservation officers and all other officers authorized to make arrests are given liberal powers in regulating motor boats. The new law, which applies to motor boats operating on all inland waters and connecting waters of the Great Lakes and within a quarter mile of shore on the Great Lakes, makes reckless driving with a motor boat a misdemeanor, for which a severe penalty is attached. The law provides that no motor boat shall be operated "in a reckless manner or at an excessive rate of speed so as to en-

danger the life or property of any person in or on said waters, having due regard to the presence of other boats, bathers, persons engaged in fishing, or objects in or on such waters and of any other conditions then existing, and no person shall operate such motor boat on said waters at a rate of speed greater than will permit him to bring it to a stop within the assured clear distance ahead." All motor boats operated on these waters during the period from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise shall be equipped with a light on the bow which can be plainly distinguished at a distance of 500 feet. A satisfactory muffler or under-water exhaust must be part of the equipment of all motor boats and the muffler or under-water exhaust must remain closed and in proper working order at all times when the motor is operating. The only exception to this provision is when the boat is engaged in a supervised motor boat race, regatta or speed trial.

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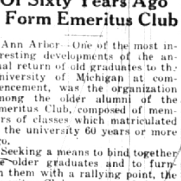
Michigan Graduates Of Sixty Years Ago Form Emeritus Club

Ann Arbor—One of the most interesting developments of the annual return of old graduates to the University of Michigan at commencement, was the organization among the older alumni of the Emeritus Club, composed of members of classes which matriculated in the university 60 years or more ago. Seeking a means to bind together the older graduates and to furnish them with a rallying point, the Emeritus Club grew out of the reunion of alumni who attended the university during the time of President Haven and the early years of President Angell's administration. The plan was first advanced by Luther Conant, '62 '64, of Oak Park, Ill., and quickly gained favor among the old graduates. Because of varying graduation dates due to the differing lengths of courses it was decided to make the entrance date the basis for eligibility. All emeritus professors of the club are members of the club, whether alumni of the university or not. During reunion times the emeritus club plans to furnish a congenial rallying place for all old grads, and will make a special effort to include in its activities all of the older alumni whose classes are not holding regular reunions. Service to the shut-ins, ill or very old alumni, through correspondence, administration of bequests for other group matters, is also planned. Reunions of the Emeritus Club will be held annually. At the first meeting Professor Emeritus Trumbull was elected president, and Levi D. Wines secretary, while Professor J. Raleigh Nelson acted as host on the part of the university.

DECREASE REPORTED IN CLAM FISHING

Lansing.—An enormous decrease in the number of clammers using southern Michigan streams this year as compared with 1930 is reported by the Department of Conservation. While approximately 1,500 clam licenses had been issued at this time last year, only 211 of the 1931 licenses have been sold. The increase in the cost of the license from \$1 to \$3 and the present low price offered for clam shells are the reasons given for the slump in the clam industry in Michigan. 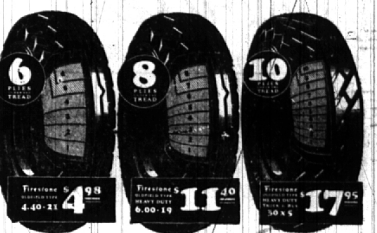
