Other Departments Report

These services materially increase the costs charged to government, but in most cases are handled through private agencies they would be paid by the same individuals and at a much higher cost. The most important work of the commission and the one which demands the utmost nicety of judgment is in determining the extent to which the citizens requires and is prepared to pay for those services and in that task any commission needs the constant co-operation and support of the electors.

The report contains both current and capital accounts for the village-at-large, excluding the water department, a record of all legal actions in which the village was involved during 1930, a survey of licenses granted and permits issued from the clerk's department, and short reports and statistics from the health officer, village nurse, sanitary inspector and health laboratory.

In his report, Mr. Parry comments as follows on the village engineering department: "The work of the engineering department represents in my judgment one of the most conservative and long time economies of any of our village activities. Not only does it save unnecessary and unwise expenditures on the improvement work as it is installed but by correct design and intelligent material reduces maintenance charges in years to come."
