MOORE RESIGNS AT CRANBROOK

Arts And Crafts Head To Study In Europe; Other Changes Announced

C. Warren Moore, head of the arts and crafts department at Cranbrook School for Boys since its opening in 1927, has resigned from the faculty to spend a year of study in Europe. It has been announced by the board of directors at the school in its list of appointments to the staff and faculty for 1931-32.

A few other changes and additions were made in the faculty and one in the staff, but there were no changes in the advisory board, board of trustees or board of directors.

Mr. Moore plans to leave for France on Aug. 1 where he will study until November, after which he will proceed to Austria and Germany for further study. He has no plans for next year, he said in a statement Friday.

"I regret leaving Cranbrook very much, of course," he said, "but a man should take every opportunity for self-improvement which offers itself. I am going abroad for a period of individual growth, to study with men who know a great deal more about the arts and crafts than I feel I cannot afford to let the opportunity pass."

Mr. Moore will be succeeded at Cranbrook by John Cunningham, who holds A. B. and A. M. degrees from the University of California. Other new masters added to the 1931-32 faculty are as follows:

William Schultz, Jr., B. S. University of Michigan, master in science and mathematics; Robert Carson, A. B. and A. M., University of Michigan, master in history; Chines Van Antwerp, A. B., University of Michigan, who will teach a variety of subjects.

John J. Finney, formerly master in Latin, has been named head of the mathematics department and master in physics. Thelma Egan, B. S. and A. B., N. W. University of Michigan, has been appointed librarian to succeed Margaret Frayer.

Other members of the 1930-31 faculty besides Mr. Moore who will not return this fall are Edward L. Lund, master in mathematics; John C. Dreier, master in history; and Hardee Chambliss, Jr., master in English.

LOCAL YOUTH, 15, WINS GOLF TITLE

Sinks 16-Foot Puff For 4th Flight Crown In District Tourney

Believed to be the youngest player who ever won a prize in the Detroit district, Fred Schwarze, 15-year-old, who will be a sophomore at Baldwin High School next fall, was declared champion of the district tournament last Friday when he defeated William Buchanan, University of Michigan graduate representing Barton Hills, one up in the final round.

Schwarze, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman G. C. Schwarze, Kensington road, was the youngest player entered in the tournament and took four straight matches to cop the fourth flight title.

Victory came to the Birmingham youth in one of the most hair-raising finishes in district history. Playing on the Franklin Hills course, the pair battled on even terms all the way. Each won the same number of strokes in reaching the 18th green, where Schwarze sank a 16-foot putt which made Buchanan so nervous he missed with his ball lying two feet from the cup.

Schwarze, who is a brother of Herman Schwarze, captain of Baldwin High School's football team in 1929-30, had never before completed in the district amateur. It was his first prize in only a few weeks ago when he took the championship of flight "B" in the Birmingham Golf Club tourney.

A fine pair of binoculars was his portion of victory in the district meet.

Justice's Succession To Township Supervisor's Post

It was strange to see an entire grand opera cast and orchestra in various stages of summer comfort instead of the customary "faded shirts" and "faded trousers." Obviously for the radio listener comfort was unnecessary, as most of the orchestra and many of the cast appeared in shirt sleeves and suspenders. With the exception of three leads, however, from La Scala and the Royal Opera at Rome, the entire cast of 40 voices and the orchestra of between 70 and 80 pieces belonged strictly to the radio station, and are kept solely for this work.

They put on the other night a very thrilling performance, in which the music rose frequently to wild climaxes, accompanied by crashing of Oriental gongs and sounding of trumpets, the principal climax ending with hysterical Paganini-like laughter from the four male leads.

For radio purposes, in order not to shatter the sensitive microphones, an entire section of four

trombones and four trumpets had been put at one corner of the orchestra with their backs to the director, and for this purpose had a special conductor of their own whose duty it was to keep an eye on the conductor and keep perfect time and harmony with him.

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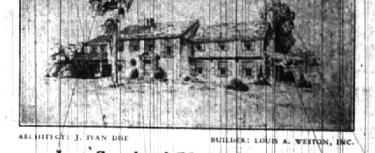

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Europaragraphs

(Which are notes from an Eclectic reporter on a 12,000-mile motor tour of the principal countries of Europe)

Evidences of modernism in street railway transportation were observed in Vicenza, a small but busy city northwest of Padua on the Milan road. Here the city has installed the trackless trolleys which are just making their entrance into many American cities.

One of the most fortunate experiences of the trip was our arrival in Milan on the day of the holiday of the Ascension. Consequently we were able to visit Milan Cathedral the most impressive we have seen. With due regard to their sanctity and dignity as churches, many of the largest cathedrals are of an architecture better suited to a railroad station, but the high vaulted ceiling and beautiful windows illuminated by an Italian morning sun gave Milan Cathedral a most impressive aspect.

In brilliant contrast to the candle-illuminated darkness of the interior was the trip up winding stairs to the top of the high spire for a view of the city. Here, high above Italy's greatest metropolis, we were nearly blinded by the glare of hot sun on the stones of the Milan streets, though there was another exit and few people on the car, we were roughly jostled as they came out at the street at a stop, and it is believed that at that time the passport, which usually is carried on the person in Italy, was stolen from a pocket.

By one of the most unfortunate and annoying experiences of the trip our stay in Milan, chief city of Italy, was forcibly lengthened from one day to five by the theft of the family passport. By a Milan street-car, though there was another exit and few people on the car, we were roughly jostled as they came out at the street at a stop, and it is believed that at that time the passport, which usually is carried on the person in Italy, was stolen from a pocket.

Police officials and the American consulate believe that this is a recurrence of operations of an international gang of thieves who used Milan as their center for some time but recently abandoned attempts. At one time the city was known as one of the world's worst centers for pickpocketing.

The native's respect for documents and particularly those for which he has no use lead in Milan to the unusual but excellent custom of dropping stolen or found passports and other documents in to the nearest mailbox. Two, a Canadian and a French, were found the day after ours was lost and the consulate is quite certain that ours will be recovered. 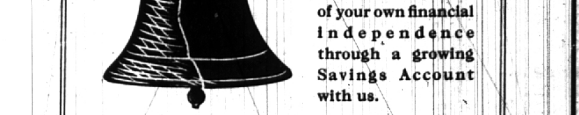

Constant and somewhat ruthless improvement is going on in the city. In a large area near our hotel, huge viaducts are being torn down and a number of smaller buildings being destroyed to make way for a large and beautiful parkway. This will be the largest extension of the park, and is operated on a plan similar to the Adler Planetarium at Grant Park, Chicago. Showings accompanied by lectures on varying astronomical subjects are given each Wednesday, Thursday, and Saturday evening.

Another feature of the park is the zoological gardens, which are the size of those at Belle Isle, Detroit, and in comparison with the great zoo at Rome are somewhat insignificant. But they are as popular as anything in the park, and on Sundays and holidays attract large crowds. Perhaps it is psychology that caused the park authorities to refrain from erecting "Don't Feed the Animals" signs, but "What's in their stead on certain cages," it is permitted to give these animals grass or food.
