Rough Western Mountain Trails Lead To Beauty, Birmingham Residents Find

After all that has been said and done and written about the beauty of the golden west, many of us are inclined to take it for granted that there is much to be seen and explored west of the mountains.

But in it still remains from travel-worn roads, the hidden beauties of mountain lakes and canyons waiting to be admired by the tourist. Some of these newer beauty spots were recently visited by Mrs. Charles J. Shain of Birmingham, who returned last Thursday after an extensive western trip in which they followed the Pacific coast north from San Francisco for more than a thousand miles.

"We didn't start out to make a tour of the parks, as we had seen them before. This time we were looking for new places of the western coast. And we found them," Mrs. Shain explained. "We did visit two of the newest parks which have been opened about three years ago, the government has made through dense forests, over cliffs and almost inaccessible heights and depths.

"It is not a large canyon, but a very remarkable one for its unique beauty. Descending to the floor of the canyon, a depth of 1,000 feet, we find a fantastic city of rose and red with pillars and spires and domes resembling the sky line of a modern metropolis.

"It has the most interesting color of Bryce Canyon. Larger than Bryce is Zion Canyon, which about the same size as Yosemite but it is more easily accessible than Bryce. One of the beautiful characteristics is the stratum of red rock which runs through the various formations.

through the various formations. Because of the brilliance of its coloring the main cliff is called Vermilion Cliffs. "The largest formation in this canyon is called the Great White Throne, rising at its base 1,000 feet or so from the floor of the canyon, it resembles a great monolith.

"Although many travelers are familiar with the sixth rim of the Grand Canyon, few have approached it from the north rim, which was but recently opened by the government.

"To reach the north rim one must travel through 100 miles of desert. These are the most quaking aspens, pine, spruce, and all the thick undergrowth of the virgin wood," Mrs. Shain continued. "At first we were sorry we at-

tempted it, but as we went on and found it very much worth while. Few forests are so fine as those in it are to be found vast herds of deer, many of which can be seen coming out to graze in the protection of evening shadows.

"This forest is the native haunt of the white tailed squirrel, which can be found in no other place of the world. It has a large bushy white tail resembling that of an angora cat.

"The north rim is much wider and very different from the southern rim of the Grand Canyon. It is much lower, colder, and there is no suggestion of the desert. The colorful formations which form the background in this picture looking from the southern rim, appear even more tawny viewed from the northern rim, as they are so much nearer.

"In Oregon Mr. and Mrs. Shain visited a much less frequented beauty spot called Crater Lake, of special interest because it is an inverted volcano. Mrs. Shain continued: "At one time, a volcano must have collapsed, leaving a great hole with sheer cliffs rising a thousand feet or more above a mountain lake of cobalt blue.

"The Indians thought this lake was the home of the powerful I-lao, spirit of waters, and indeed, having visited it, one can understand why the silent beauty of water and cliff is so impressive."
