**ROTARY CLUB VIEWS GROWTH**

 Seven past-presidents of the Birmingham Rotary Club Monday noon related the accomplishments of their respective tenure of office, and George B. Boutwell, the new president, was inducted into a program arranged and presided over by Harry Bissett, new program chairman for this year.

**DETROIT PLAYERS TO APPEAR HERE**

**Lions Club Brings Troupe For Benefit Shows Tuesday And Wednesday**  
 Two performances by the Detroit Players, a travelling troupe of professional actors and actresses, will be given here Tuesday and Wednesday nights under the auspices of the Birmingham Lions Club for the benefit of its defective youth fund.  
 "The Haunted House," billed as a light mystery play, will be the feature Tuesday night, while "Your Uncle Dudley," a comedy drama, will be played Wednesday.  
 The performances will be staged in a mammoth tent to be erected on a lot at the corner of Martin and Bates streets, one block south of Maple avenue. The company, composed of 15 players, comes to Birmingham on its fourth annual summer tour of Michigan towns and cities.  
 The proposed fountain, which is designed to replace the present fountain erected on the park last year, is an elaborate structure with a 12-foot brick base encompassed by extensive landscaping improvements which would give the fountain the added appearance of a gateway to the park.

 Standing broad jump; 100-yard dash; standing hop, step and jump; chinning; overhead shot; high jump; shot put; running hop, step and jump; dip, and running broad jump.  
 Entries must be made at the Y. M. C. A. at least two days before the contest, Neff said.



**Payment Lowered**  
 The payment demanded by the ordinance for releasing a dog from the pound is \$1 in contrast to the \$5 rate provided in the previous temporary ordinance.

 In the meantime, the laboratory work that does present itself is being done by the state and county, Dr. Kemp announced. The new arrangement will mean a significant saving to the village, he said.
