2 HURT, DRIVER FINED IN CRASH

Woman, Boy Are Victims As Motorist Drives Through Red Light

A woman and a 4-year-old boy were injured in an automobile crash at Woodward avenue and Long Lake road at 6:10 P. M. Sunday, caused, according to Bloomfield Hills police, by a driver who ran against a red traffic signal at the intersection.

The boy, Halpi Posee, of 266 South Edith street, Pontiac, suffered a gash on the forehead and a slight concussion. Mrs. Theodore Service, 1529 North street, Flint, sustained a badly wrenched back. Both were treated at St. Joseph Hospital, Pontiac.

Ralph was a passenger in a car driven by William Johnston 292 Marshall boulevard, Pontiac, which, according to Sergeant Delos Anderson, drove more than 100 feet against the traffic signal and crashed into a second car driven by Christ Yach, 730 Mary street, Flint, in which Mrs. Service was riding.

Yach, Anderson and several other passengers in both machines were badly shaken up, although not injured.

Anderson was arrested on a charge of reckless driving, to which he pleaded guilty before Justice Floyd S. Buck Monday afternoon and paid a \$30 fine.

Gilbert when Babcock was brought before him Monday.

The postponement means that Babcock will be sentenced at the same time as Willis M. Brewer, who was found guilty of embezzling \$30,000 from the American Legion billet at Otter Lake.

UNPAID 1930 TAX REPORTED

County Survey Shows 55 Per Cent Delinquency in Levies On Townships

More than 55 percent of the total 1930 state, county, and special assessment taxes levied on townships in Oakland County were returned as delinquent on the townships made their report to the county on May 1, it was announced Friday by John M. Goepfert, chief county accountant.

Of the total levy, amounting to \$4,788,961, which includes township state, county and special taxes, only \$2,664,861 was paid, according to the report. The figures do not include school, local municipal or township government taxes.

Bloomfield township stands 13th in the list of 25, with a delinquency of 43.236 percent. Addition township returned the smallest delinquency, with only 15.964 percent unpaid. Troy township was 22nd with a delinquency of 67.93 percent, and Southfield 24th with 66.388 percent.
