Gauss Bakery Nine Noses Out Locals With Rally in Seventh

A two run rally in the seventh inning gave a 6 to 5 victory to the Gauss Bakery nine of Pontiac over the Birmingham Merchants in a fast game played Sunday at the Bloomfield Township Park diamond.

## VILLAGE MOVES TO PROTECT BUILDERS

Votes Restrictions On Cement Block Makers, Distributors

An ordinance which provides that all manufacturers and distributors of cement building blocks in Birmingham must be licensed to sell their product here was adopted Monday night by the Village Commission. The license fee was established at \$10.

In presenting the ordinance, Village Manager James W. Parry stated that the purpose of it was "to protect the builder in regard to the quality of blocks used in his building."

The ordinance specifies the kind and quality of materials which must be used in the blocks.

Since the licensing order will affect several manufacturers outside the village limits, the ordinance met some objection of technical grounds from Village Attorney George H. Ogden and Commissioner Fred L. Tucker, both of whom suggested that it might be more satisfactory to charge an inspection fee to cover the cost of examining the blocks used in each new building, the fee to be assessed at the time the building permit is issued and paid by the person to whom the permit is granted.

The ordinance was adopted, however, after Mr. Parry declared that all dealers and manufacturers whose building blocks are distributed in Birmingham had been interviewed on the measure, and that all had expressed their approval.

Eleven persons were injured, five of them seriously, when two automobiles collided late Sunday night at the corner of Thirteen Mile and Greenfield roads.

William Hiller, 9329 Monica avenue, Detroit, the driver of one car, escaped with minor cuts and bruises, but his daughter, Edith, 12 years old, sustained severe contusions of the eye, head and arm, and his father-in-law, George Killets, 66 years old, received a contusion of the scalp, abrasions, shock and injuries of the back.

The occupants of the other machine, all of whom were injured, included Michael Miller, of York, Pa., the driver; his sister, Isobell, and their parents, Mr. and Mrs. James A. Miller, and Lloyd Potendurf, all of York; and Ralph Falkenwrath, his wife, Mae, and their daughter, Betty, 8 years old, of 2325 Harvard road, Royal Oak.

Killets, Edith Hiller, Michael Miller and Mrs. Falkenwrath were treated by Dr. C. F. Lawler in Birmingham and later removed to St. Joseph Mercy hospital in Pontiac. Miller had a severe laceration of the left arm and forehead, and Mrs. Falkenwrath suffered seriously from scalp wounds and shock.

The others were treated at the Margrave hospital in Royal Oak, where Mrs. James Miller was found badly injured. Royal Oak police investigated the crash.

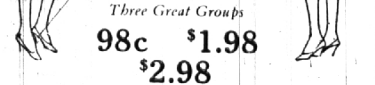
