ANN ARBOR—Ten courses of lectures on subjects of current interest by leading professors, special courses in medicine and engineering and a series of evening lectures and plays will

furnish the "schooling" for students at the second Alumni University to be held by the University of Michigan, June 23 to 27. It is announced by Wilfred B. Shaw, director of alumni relations. The regular lecture courses available to returning alumni will include: "Problems in Local Government" by Prof. Thomas H. Reed; "Evolution in its Latest Interpretations," by Prof. A. Franklin Shull; "The Contemporary Stage," by Prof. Oscar J. Campbell; "Contemporary Currents in Philosophy," by Prof. DeWitt H. Parker; "Public Control of Industry," by Prof. L. L. Sharfman; "Contemporary European and American Art," by

Assoc. Prof. Bruce M. Donaldson; "The Geological Character Line in Landscapes," by Prof. William H. Hobbs; "Genetic Principles in Behavior," by Asst. Prof. Martha G. Colby; "Contemporary Social Evolution," by Assoc. Prof. R. C. Angell; and "The Symphonic Form," by Prof. Earl V. Moore. Medical Lectures For alumni of the medical school there will be a special symposium on the heart on June 18 and 19. Lecturers will include Dr. Harold Brooks of the university and Bellevue Hospital Medical College, New York; Dr. Carl G. Wiggers of Western Reserve University; Dr. Hugo A. Freund, Detroit; and Drs. A. 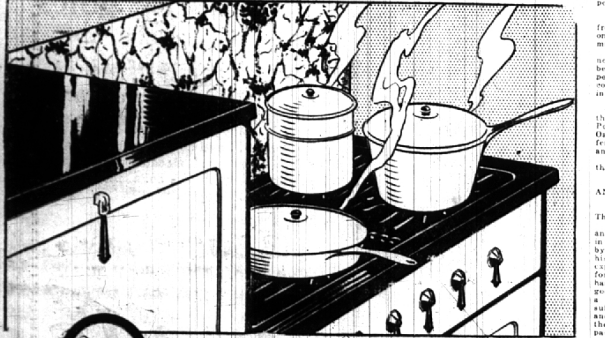

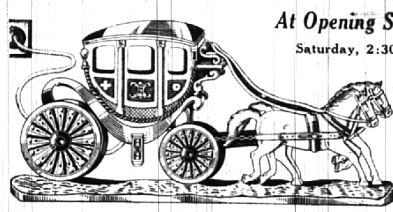

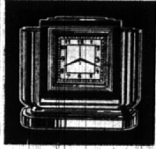

## ORDINANCE NO. 181 BAKED GOODS

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE SALE AND HANDLING OF BAKED GOODS.

The Village of Birmingham Ordinance No. 181 shall be enforced for any person, firm or corporation engaged in the selling of baked goods... by himself, herself, or themselves or by his, her or their agent or employee to expose any such baked goods or pastries for sale within the Village of Birmingham, without first placing such baked goods or pastries for sale in a sanitary container, package or case sufficiently tight against dirt and other contamination and to prevent the handling of such goods or pastries by others than such agents or employees.

Section 2. No person who is affected with any infectious disease, or with any venereal disease in a communicable form, shall handle or engage in the sale of such baked goods or pastries, and any person, firm or corporation knowingly employing or permitting such person to so handle or engage in the sale of such baked goods or pastries, shall be deemed guilty of the violation of this ordinance.

Section 3. Any person, firm or corporation, who himself or his or her clerk, agent or employee shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$100.00 or to imprisonment in the County Jail for a period not to exceed 90 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

Section 4. This ordinance, being for the public health, shall take effect immediately upon its publication hereof. Made and passed by the Commission of the Village of Birmingham on this 1st day of June, A. D. 1931.
